News from Western High School

PRINCIPALLY SPEAKING ... WORDS FROM MR. DAVIS

I hope the 2012-2013 school year has been treating everyone well. It has been a whirlwind of a start to a school year as we welcome in the Class of 2016, bring into the fold several new faculty and staff members, adjust to the various components of the new teacher evaluation system, and just try to keep up with the day-to-day activities and opportunities.

Although it has been more hectic than ever, I continue to witness wonderful teaching and learning at Western High School. I have also been so pleased with the efforts and success of our athletic and fine arts programs which have not only presented themselves with class and dedication but have also been able to bring home exciting victories sectional championships, and yet another State Championship for the Western Marching Band!

As you may have noticed, Western High School received a grade of a "B" from the Indiana Department of Education. So, what exactly does a grade of a "B" mean? At the high

school level, schools are "graded" on four metrics:

Student Performance: The percentage of students passing Algebra I and English 10 ECA by the end of their sophomore year.

Student Improvement: A measure of the number of students who improve from 8th grade to 10th grade (based on ISTEP+ and ECA comparisons) and the number who improve from 10th grade to graduation.

Graduation Rate: The percentage of students who graduate in four years.

College and Career Readiness: A measure of the percent of students who demonstrate success in Advanced Placement, Dual Credit, or Industry Certification programs.

It is important to note that the "B" rating Western earned was given with a graduation rate of 90.7%, a College and Career Readiness success rating of close to 58% (State goal is 25%), an Algebra I ECA passing percentage of 83.4%, and an English 10

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ECA passing percentage of 78.4%. We showed slight negative improvement from 8th grade to 10th grade but marked improvement (22 out of 25) by the time the student graduated. While WHS is generally pleased with our results, we are in no way content. We are working diligently to continue to improve all of the measures of student success.

In closing, I would like to say thank you to all of the students, parents, teachers, and staff that make Western such a wonderful place. I enjoy coming to work each day and feel so blessed to be a part of this terrific school and the Western family. I am so proud of our students, teachers, and coaches, not just for the public successes, but for the day in and day out efforts and positive attitudes. We still have a ways to go, and our goals are high, but together we can reach them. Thank you and go Panthers!

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WHAT IS "WEB" WEDNESDAY?

During the 2009-2010 school year each of the School Improvement Goal Action Teams developed an action plan focused on improving a specific school improvement goal.

The Reading Performance Goal Action Team formulated an aggressive but doable plan that involved modifying the Wednesday schedule to allow for a block of time for reading strategy instruction alternating with other enrichment lessons. This idea coupled with the action plans from the Graduation Rate and Attendance Rate Goal Action Teams resulted in what will be referred to as Western Enrichment Block or WEB.

The title of WEB was chosen for reasons much deeper than the obvious acronym of Wednesday Enrichment Block. Western's WEB is our effort to catch our students and help them find success.

One strand of the WEB is the effort to improve reading with research-based best practice strategies. Another strand focuses on the aspect of attendance, and another strand focuses on the closely related graduation rate. The final strand of this WEB is the intentional effort for teachers to "get to know" a specific group of students on a much deeper level than can usually be attained in normal teacherstudent interactions.

The focus during the 2012 – 2013 school year continues to be primarily upon reading comprehension utilizing "Texts and Lessons for Content-Area Reading" by Harvey Daniels and Nancy Steineke. The "reading" weeks will be followed by a re-teaching of the lesson through "life application" lessons focusing on life skill topics such as choosing insurance, changing a tire, eating properly, and other practical skills.. The goal is to have the topics re-enforce the same reading comprehension strategy introduced in an earlier week. Additional WEB sessions will include independent reading and other enrichment activities planned by the various departments.

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Through our school improvement plan, Western is working to catch all of our students in our WEB and help them find success in both school and life.

NEWS FROM OUR NURSE - Brenda Strunk

A Medication Authorization Form must be completed by a parent and/or guardian prior to administering any medication during school hours. This form can be obtained from the high school office, the school nurse, or the school website. To obtain it via the web, go to the Western School Corporation site (http://corp. western.k12.in.us/) click on "Info", then "Document Library". In the top left box under "Health/ Medical Forms is the "Request for Administration of Medicine" form.

All medications must be kept in the nurse's office. The

only exception to this is if a student has physician ordered Emergency Medication that needs to be carried at all times and has provided the school with the proper documentation for the student to carry the medicine(s).

Both prescription and over the counter medications must be kept in the original container when at school and must be age appropriate. Medication sent to school in a ziploc bag or aluminum foil will not be accepted. Medication sent to school in this manner will be kept in the nurse's office until a parent and/or guardian can

pick it up.

If a student is bringing the medication to school, it must be taken to the nurse immediately upon arriving to school.

Also, in order for a high school student to take medication home, a parent must send a written note indicating the need to send the medication home with the student at the end of the school day. Please sign and date the note before sending it with your child.

HONORS BIOLOGY CLASSES EXPERIENCE THE WILDCAT

Mrs. Pemberton and Mr. Morelock's honors biology students went on a field trip to explore Wildcat Creek and learned about soil and water conservation. Students were shown a video called the Wildcat Creek, Community Treasure during class time. The video was created in the spring of 2010 by the Wildcat Guardian, a volunteer group dedicated to help preserving and protecting the "health and beauty" of Wildcat Creek.

On September 6th, the classes traveled to Camp Tycony where soil and water experts from the community taught them using hands on

activities during the Wildcat Experience. The focus was on water quali ty, local wildlife, our local watershed, and the wildcat creek. The experts provided a lunch and then students went back out for afternoon activities. Everyone learned how important taking care of our local environment was and had a great day outdoors.

BIOLOGY STUDENTS COMPLETE RESEARCH

Mrs. Pemberton's microbiology students have been researching careers associated with the field of microbiology. They are exploring training, life style, salary, and job satisfaction for the career that they choose.

The focus of study these nine weeks has been on learning basic lab skills like gram stains and creating cultures of bacteria. Students have been learning the causes of diseases in specific body areas such as the integumentary system, nervous system, and cardiac system. They are studying past and present diseases of Indiana. This includes the

current outbreak of aspergillus meningitis, as well as serious infections of the past such as histoplasmosis outbreak which started in Indianapolis.

The Olympics were the culmination of the research project. Students competed for gold, silver, and bronze "medals" in such events as a tortilla toss and a soccer dribble. The day ended with the announcement of team winners and

Overall, students were successful in completing World Language State Standard 8 for their individual language classes by using knowledge of languages and cultures for personal enrichment.

WESTERN HIGH SCHOOL MARCHING BAND WINS AGAIN

This year, the Marching Panthers marched their way to their 5th consecutive State Championship. Since 1982, the band has accumulated a grand total of 13 State titles. In addition, Western's band earned the 2012 Band of America Class A Grand National Championship. It is the fifth national title for the school which also won in 1984, 1985. 1988 and 1990.

"Strangely enough, winning competitions is not the primary goal of the band but considered a result of the process of preparation and of mental attitude," according to Brian Caldwell who is in his eighth season as head director.

mankind. The sea can be violent, calm, soothing or threatening. It can nurture life and take life. "...On the Water's Edge"




